WWOA's Board of Directors, Chapter Chairs and board members, Committee chairs and members, WWOA's Volunteer Wisconsin AmeriCorps member, and office staff have given of their time and talents to continue our mission of educating Wisconsin's private woodlands owners in creating sustainable woodlands.


WWOA Board members and I have lead the way in making WWOA more visible to Wisconsin's decision makers, natural resource professionals, woodland owners, and other conservation organizations. Your efforts, whether in your neighborhood, county or across the state, are very important in telling our story of being a good woodland stewards. We encourage members to reach out to others, share your passion, and invite them to join WWOA using our new membership brochure.


WWOA's bylaws have been reviewed by the Board and three changes are being proposed. These will be discussed and voted on at the 2016 Annual Meeting.


To improve WWOA effectiveness, the WWOA Board met twice monthly via conference calls to make more timely decisions in addition to in person quarterly meetings.


2015-2016 Year in Review


 Thank you to WWOA's Board of Directors: President Paul Kienitz, Vice President Steven Ring, Secretary Mike Bohman, Treasurer Arlene Roehl, and Directors David Congos, Jack Kucksdorf, Margaret A. Parsons, Steven Raether, Charles R. Wagner, Richard Wagner and Randy Williams.

 In 2015, Chuck Wagner and Randy Williams were reelected and Jack Kucksdorf and Margaret Parsons were newly elected to the Board of Directors.

 WWOA created a new membership brochure and exhibit boards with our new theme of *Creating Tomorrow's Woodlands Today*.

 WWOA received a WEEB grant to assist members in reaching their next generation. Copies of the My Land Handbook will be distributed at the 2016 Annual Meeting.

 A generous WWOA member offered \$10,000 to the Endowment Fund while challenging fellow member to match the gift. WWOA used a small distribution from the WWOA Endowment Fund to purchase a new office laptop and software.

 WWOA closely followed and represented members on the proposed legislative changes to the Managed Forest Law (MFL) program. Act 358 was signed into law in April 2016. WWOA kept members informed of these changes. Director David Congos spent many hours representing WWOA in the revised Dispute Resolution Process. The Board continues to express concern about this process. As the MFL changes are implemented the WWOA Board will continue to provide input.

2015-16 President's Message

This past year the WWOA Board continued to work on our 2015-2020 Strategic Plan goals through four working groups: organizational structure, financial stability, building membership and education and partnerships.

The Organizational Structure work group, chaired by Randy Williams, reviewed and revised WWOA's internal committee structure and organizational chart. A new committee was created, Forestry & Natural Resources, and the president appointed committee chairs subject to board approval.

The Financial Stability work group, chaired by Arlene Roehl, recommended slightly increasing membership dues for the first time in eight years. The spring 2016 *News from Wisconsin Woods* newsletter was posted on our website and emailed to members, saving on printing and mailing costs.

The Building Membership work group attracted new members through increased information posted to WWOA's website, timely email updates on the Managed Forest Law program changes, and regular Facebook postings. WWOA created a new membership brochure, tag line and exhibit board materials to better market our educational efforts and networking opportunities for woodland owners

The Education and Partnerships work group, chaired by Steve Ring, worked on your behalf to reach out to a variety of forestry and conservation based organizations for potential partnership opportunities.

WWOA's Volunteer WI AmeriCorps member, Elise Worthel, worked with members to connect them to fun and productive volunteer activities such as serving on committees, helping in the office, or doing projects at their home.

WWOA received a WI Environmental Educational Board (WEEB) grant to assist WWOA members with engaging their next generation. Volunteer WI AmeriCorps member, Elise Worthel, created and promoted two Growing Your Legacy

Field Days for July however response was low resulting in cancellation of the field days.

The WEEB grant was revised allowing for the finalizing and printing of WWOA's new My Land Handbook. This impressive Handbook was envisioned by member Helen Moberg and brought to life by Elise Worthel and the Women of WWOA. It was distributed at the WI Tree Farm field day in August. It will also be distributed at the 2016 WWOA Annual Meeting.

The Endowment Committee, chaired by Merlin Becker, received a generous \$10,000 match challenge from a very caring long-time member. As of July 27, WWOA members have generously donated \$4850 toward this challenge. Your help is needed for us to reach the full \$10,000 match which we hope to reach at the 2016 Annual Meeting.

The Fundraising Committee, chaired by Jan Lehrer, worked very hard leading up to and during the 2015 Annual Meeting to raise a record \$18,000 through the Annual Fundraiser, Friday evening raffle, Saturday basket raffle, and silent auction. All of these activities help to diversify and secure WWOA's financial future.

As my presidency comes to an end, I want to thank all WWOA members. Thank you for your support of WWOA's mission, for your willingness to create a better organization with your input, and for sharing of your time and talents so that we can expand in new directions.

We are all WWOA – we need to share our passion for sustainable forest management across all of Wisconsin's woodlands and engage others to support our mission now and for future generations. I have been honored to represent you and our wonderful organization during these past two years.

2015 Annual Meeting Minutes

HOTEL MARSHFIELD, MARSHFIELD

September 19, 2015

- 1. CALL TO ORDER:** President Paul Kienitz called the meeting to order at 10:34 AM. Kienitz led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- 2. ELECTION OF CHAIR PRO TEM: M/S/P – Jim Wagener/Jim Kissinger:** Motion to make Paul Kienitz chairperson pro tem. Paul Kienitz thanked everyone for electing him chairperson pro tem.
- 3. WWOA PURPOSE AND INTRODUCTIONS:** President Kienitz read the WWOA Purpose. Kienitz pointed out the agenda, annual report, and strategic plan in the meeting registration folders. He introduced the WWOA Board of Directors and identified the committees they served on: Marilyn Steele, Vice President serving on Nominating, Presidents Council on Chapters (Chapter Chairs), Strategic Planning Building Membership work group; Arlene Roehl, Treasurer, Finance, and Women of WWOA Committees, Strategic Planning Financial Stability work group; Mike Bohman, Secretary; Chuck Wagner, Past Presidents Committee; Dave Congos, represents WWOA on DNR Red Pine Annosum Team and DNR Dispute Resolution Team; Jan Lehrer, Fundraising and Nominating Committees, represents WWOA on WI Tree Farm Committee, LEAF and Trees For Tomorrow advisory committee; Steve Raether, represents WWOA on the Council on Forestry - Accountability work group, Steve Ring, Strategic Planning Education & Partnerships work group, represents WWOA at the WI SFI-SIC Committee; Richard Wagner, Strategic Planning Financial Stability work group; Randy Williams, Strategic Planning Organizational Structure work group, represents WWOA on the NRCS Technical Committee. Kienitz thanked the board for the time and effort they had put in. He then presented commemorative boxes to outgoing board members, Jan Lehrer and Marilyn Steele, in recognition of their time on the board.

Kienitz then introduced the nonboard committee chairs: Awards, Marcia Frost Vahradian; Endowment, Marv Meier & Merlin Becker; Gift Shop, Jim & Marlene Zdanovec; Publications, Ed Moberg; Science, Dave Hall & Brent McCown; Website, Rich Warosh; and Wildlife, Dale Zaug.

President Kienitz thanked and introduced the Chapter Chairs: Bad Axe, Gary Rieniets; Blackhawk, Colleen Lourigan; Black River, David VonRuden; Central Sands, Jim Wagener & Buzz Vahradian; Chippewa Valley, Merlyn Jones; NEWFO, Chuck Wagner; North Central, Shirley Bargander; Northwest, Bobbi Freitag; Phoenix Falls, Jesse Sebero; West Central, Carl Nelson; Winnebagoland, Nancy Wirtz and Wolf River, Dean Mehlberg. He referred to the chapters as the spokes of a wheel.
- 4. AGENDA REVISIONS AND ADOPTION: M/S/P –Mike Gehrke/Dave Hall:** Motion to adopt agenda as printed.
- 5. MINUTES OF SEPTEMBER 20, 2014 ANNUAL MEETING: M/S/P – Al Barden/Arlene Roehl:** Motion to accept the minutes of the September 20, 2014 meeting.
- 6. PRESIDENT'S REPORT:** Paul Kienitz once again thanked the Board of Directors. He plans to continue to visit chapters in 2015-16. He is very happy with the chapters he has already visited. He is trying to improve communications with WWOA members through the use of Constant Contact emails, Facebook, and WWOA's website. The Board has increased their number of meetings this past year. He has spent time trying to inform legislators about the impact of the State Budget on private woodland owners. Kienitz will continue to implement our strategic plan and to reach out to forest owners and our legislators.
- 7. TREASURER'S REPORT:** Arlene Roehl presented an overview of the Treasurer's report and she put a plug in for supporting WWOA's Silent Auction. We ended the year with Total Assets of \$276,161.80.

- 8. COMMITTEE REPORTS:**
 - A. ENDOWMENT:** Merlin Becker presented information on WWOA's Endowment Fund. The current balance is \$45,217. Donation envelopes were placed in the September issue of *Wisconsin Woodlands* magazine. The Committee has set a goal of \$250,000 by 2018 to help further WWOA's mission.

8. COMMITTEE REPORTS (continued):

B. GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS: Chuck Wagner reported on government affairs. Richard Wedepohl took over for Gene Roark as chair of this committee, but now is spending a lot of his time with another organization with goals similar to ours. Chuck Wagner will be taking a more active role in government affairs. Wagner wants to partner with more organizations to make our impact larger in Madison. He feels the State Budget took a lot of our time this past year.

C. STRATEGIC PLANNING: President Paul Kienitz explained how we came up with the strategic plan. The Board asked the general membership what they wanted, then set goals that were reachable. The Board also set some goals we may never reach. Kienitz went thru the highlights of the plan. The plan has the flexibility to change as the winds change.

D. NOMINATING: Marilyn Steele talked about the difficult task the nominating committee has with trying to get members to run. Steele thanked committee members: Jan Lehrer, Randy Cooper and Marv Meier. She then introduced the 2015-16 Board of Directors and Executive Committee: Paul Kienitz, President; Steven Ring, Vice President; Mike Bohman, Secretary; Arlene Roehl, Treasurer; and Directors Dave Congos, Jack Kucksdorf – newly elected, Margaret Parsons – newly elected, Steven Raether, Chuck Wagner – reelected, Richard Wagner, and Randy Williams - reelected.

9. ELECTION OF 2015-16 NOMINATING COMMITTEE MEMBERS:

M/S/P – Chuck Wagner/Jim Wagener: Motion to appoint Randy Williams and Arlene Roehl co-chairs of the nominating committee.

M/S/P – Al Barden/Chuck Wagner: Motion to reappoint Marilyn Steele and Jan Lehrer to nominating committee.

10. MEMORIAL FUND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS: President Paul Kienitz acknowledged all the contributors to the memorial funds. President Kienitz acknowledged WWOA memorial funds created in the past year with special plaques for the families of Robert Brodhagen, Allen Burmeister, Past President LaVern Dierschow, Douglas Hendrickson, and Past West Central Chapter Chair Paul Sylla.

11. OLD BUSINESS: Chuck Wagner talked about the good times people have had as members of the Board. He asks people to stand up and offer 3 years of service as a member of the Board of Directors. The payback is not monetary, but the appreciation.

Someone questioned the status of the Seno Center. It is now a land trust and separate organization no longer connected to WWOA.

12. NEW BUSINESS: President Paul Kienitz introduced Jordan King, our new AmeriCorps volunteer for this coming year. King told us his aspirations for the year in doing great things together.

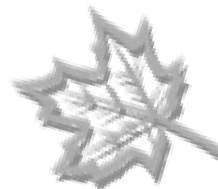

He showed where the land in the 1940s was once dry prairie and is now overgrown with red cedar. His plan is to restore the dry prairie but maintain the old bur oaks at the base. This area is known as Button Bluff where on the ridge of the bluff are two conical Indian mounds. They predate a cemetery located at the bottom of the bluff estimated to be more than one thousand years old. Michael is also an expert in knowing different types of vegetation and what prevailed in this area many years ago so his plan is to restore as much of this as he can.

Other topics discussed included using the site index to determine management goals. The Awards Committee selects the recipient(s) of WWOA's Distinguished Service Award, an award given for outstanding dedication and achievement in furthering the goals and principles of WWOA. Recipients of WWOA's Special Recognition Award are considered for special projects that have a statewide impact that may be narrow in focus. The Next Generation award is a dual award presented to an educator and a WWOA member who work together in a continuous effort to inform the next generation about the value of Wisconsin's private woodlands and sustainable forest management.

Members are encouraged to make nominations for these awards. The nomination form is available to all members with a deadline of June 1 each year. Chapters are encouraged to consider awards for their members based on chapter activities and accomplishments.

WWOA is a member of the Wisconsin Forestry Hall of Fame, founded in 1984, to give special recognition to individuals, living or deceased, who have made significant contributions to the progress of forestry in Wisconsin. WWOA Past President's Al Barden and Rachel Jordan were inducted into the Forestry Hall of Fame. The induction ceremony took place at the 2015 WWOA Annual Meeting. Al Barden was recognized for his leadership within numerous Wisconsin forestry organizations and his efforts to teach sustainable forestry to thousands of children and adults. Rachel Jordan was recognized for her state and national advocacy for private forest ownership and management. She was recognized as a Tree Farm co-owner and she was presented with Wisconsin's first National Tree Farmer of the Year award.

The committee also represents WWOA on the Wisconsin Conservation Hall of Fame, which was established to encourage the growth and practice of a conservation ethic as a legacy for the people of the State. The inductees have helped to define and extend the conservation ethic by their valuable contributions to conservation throughout their professional and personal lives. The 2016 inductees include:

Noel Jefferson Cutright (1943-2013) devoted his personal and professional life to bird conservation, citizen science and ecological restoration. He promoted the research, science and conservation initiatives of the Wisconsin Society for Ornithology and edited the landmark *Wisconsin Breeding Bird Atlas*. As Senior Ecologist working for We Energies for 29 years, he advanced environmental projects and a conservation ethic within the energy industry.

Through his 30-year career, **LeRoy Joseph Lintereur** (1920-1995) as a Game Manager with the WDNR, spent his professional and personal life protecting the resources, wildlife and wetlands of northeastern Wisconsin. As an expert witness in a precedent-setting Wisconsin Supreme Court case, he helped to defend and ultimately preserve many wetlands of Wisconsin. As a gifted naturalist, he shared his passion for nature and wild places through his teaching and writing.

We started the fiscal year with a balance of \$3,875.66 in our checkbook. The market value of WWOA's investments as of June 30, 2016 was: T. Rowe Price \$208,900.48, Anchor Bank money market account \$27,616.83, Anchor Bank 3 year membership savings account \$16,120.14 and PayPal savings \$1,002.09. In the 2015-2016 fiscal year, WWOA's income was \$156,762.09. The money from the two new Life Memberships totaling \$960.00 was transferred from the checking account and invested in T. Rowe Price.

Due to the Strategic Planning effort all internal and external WWOA committees are in the process of being reviewed. I have been appointed the new chair and to this point we have not established our new committee or the specifics of how this committee will operate. DISTURBANCE AND RECOVERY -- The committee is negotiating with NC Chapter to hold a joint field day on the Flambeau River State Forest to look at the recovery of the forest on the "Big Block" after the 1977 blowdown. We are still working to negotiate a date.

CLIMATE WARMING CONFERENCE -- We were talking with WI SAF to hold a joint conference on Managing our Woodlands in a Warming Climate. WI Chapter of the SAF is busy hosting the national convention in Madison this year. The issue is still pending.
